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MADAM CHAIR: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. We call the State Board Meeting back to order. Would you call the attendance, please? MS. CORDIAL: Yes. Board Member Durham? MR. DURHAM: Here. MS. CORDIAL: Board Member Flores? Probably on her way. Board Member Goff? MS. GOFF: Here. MS. CORDIAL: Board Member Mazanec? MS. MAZANEC: Here. MS. CORDIAL: Board Member McClellan? MS. McCLELLAN: Here. MS. CORDIAL: Board Member Rankin? MS. RANKIN: Here. MS. CORDIAL: And Board Member Schroeder. MADAM CHAIR: Here. Thank you. Our first item this morning is a very happy one, the recognition of Colorado's outstanding educators. The first item is to recognize the 2017 Colorado Teacher of the Year. Commissioner Anthes? MS. ANTHES: Yes, thank you, Madam We are really excited to be honoring our 2017 Chairwoman. Teacher of the Year today, and right now, I'm going to call

24 on Executive Director of Federal Programs, Patrick Chapman,



to come and tell us a little bit about our Teacher of the 1 Year. And then we will hear from him. 2 3 MR. CHAPMAN: Okay. Thank you, As you noted, today we are here to honor Mr. 4 Commissioner. Sean Wybrant, the 2017 Colorado Teacher of the Year. 5 Each 6 year, the Colorado Teacher of the Year Program honors an exceptionally dedicated, knowledgeable, and skilled teacher 7 to represent the entire profession in Colorado. 8 The role of the Colorado Teacher of the Year 9 is to act as an education ambassador to businesses, parents, 10 service organizations, and media; a resource on the state of 11 the profession to be available for workshops and conferences 12 13 around the state; and an educator-leader involved in teacher forums and education reform. 14 A selection committee conducted a rigorous 15 selection process to choose the Colorado Teacher of the 16 Year. The selection committee consisted of representatives 17 from the State Board of Education -- Ms. Goff -- Colorado 18 19 Association of School Boards, Colorado Education Association, the Colorado Education Initiative, the Colorado 20 Parent Teacher Association, the 2015 Teacher of the Year, 21 and other representatives from the education community. 22 The application process included a written 23 24 application, letters of recommendation, a personal interview, and a site visit. Candidates were judged on 25



1 their ability to inspire students of all backgrounds and 2 abilities. The teacher is expected to play an active role 3 in the community and to have earned the respect and 4 admiration of students, parents, and colleagues. Sean 5 clearly demonstrates these qualities.

6 Sean Wybrant, a career and technical education teacher at William J. Palmer High School in 7 Colorado Springs District 11, was named the two -- I'm sorry 8 -- the 2017 Colorado Teacher of the Year by Education 9 Commissioner Katy Anthes at an assembly on October 11, 2016. 10 Mr. Wybrant has taught for 11 years, the past 4 at William 11 J. Palmer High School. He engages students in meaningful 12 13 projects and encourages exploration of a variety of topics, bringing learning to life for students. He says he became a 14 15 teacher to change the world.

16 In accepting this award, Mr. Wybrant will 17 have the opportunity to spend part of 2017 -- will have opportunity -- making public appearances in support of the 18 19 teaching profession and will be a -- will be the face of all dedicated teachers in Colorado. Sean is at the top of his 20 profession, respected and incredibly knowledgeable. 21 In April, he will be honored by the President in a ceremony at 22 23 the White House. Throughout his year, he will receive a 24 number of high-quality professional development

25 opportunities and will get to attend NASA's Space Camp



during the summer. Interim -- or Commissioner Anthes was in 1 2 attendance at the assembly. Would you like to say a few 3 words about that day? MS. ANTHES: Yes. Thank you. Yes, I just 4 want to say a few words about Sean and the assembly. It was 5 6 clear when I went there how much the entire community and the students just absolutely love you and your passion, 7 Sean, and how much of a difference you've made in that 8 school and community. And it was just absolutely riveting 9 and vibrant to be there when we announced Sean, so he --10 it's clear. I've been able to work with Sean since then on 11 a couple of things. His ability to inspire students is 12 13 amazing, and his passion just exudes from him, no matter where he -- he teaches everybody, not just students. When 14 we walked into a meeting together the other day, he 15 16 immediately said, "Let me show you something one of my 17 students is working on." And we walked through it, and so I think we couldn't have picked a better teacher for this 18 19 honor, and I'm thrilled that he's here today. Great. Now let me introduce 20 MR. CHAPMAN: Sean Wybrant, the 2017 Colorado teacher of the Year, to say 21 a few words. 22

23 (Applause)

24 MR. WYBRANT: Madam Chair and Members of the25 Board, thank you very much of taking some time this morning



to recognize educators. Not just me, but other educators 1 2 that are in the room as well. I appreciate that, as I'm 3 sure does everybody else. And thank you, Ms. Goff, for coming down and being part of the selection committee. And 4 thank you for coming down and being a part of the assembly. 5 6 I'm really excited about the opportunity that I get to be a voice for educators over the next year, and 7 I'm really excited that I get to go around and gather 8 stories from those educators. And I'm hoping over the 9 course of this year that I can take those stories and bring 10 them back and share them with you again, so that we kind of 11 have a bookend so that you can see where things are 12 13 starting, and then I can come back and tell you about all of 14 the great things that are going on. We have some really innovative and amazing 15 16 programs around the state that I've been able to learn

17 about, and while my program might have some great things 18 going on, there are other programs that have some amazing 19 things going on as well, and I look forward to sharing that 20 with you and with the entire Colorado community, and, you 21 know, with the world because that's the way I roll.

22 (Chuckling)

23 MR. WYBRANT: I also want to take just a 24 second to say thank you very much to the people from CDE, 25 who have been helping in the transition, helping me learn



and understand a little about what the roles and 1 2 responsibilities are, and some of the opportunities that I 3 have to go off and experience and explore. And I would like to just sort of end by saying thank you very much for the 4 work that you do on behalf of teachers' and students' 5 6 communities. You know, it's all about trying to make a 7 better world, and the work that you do, and the work that we do is aligned. And I'm really hoping that we can build a 8 world where students are actually building a future that is 9 bright and meaningful and powerful for everybody around 10 11 them. So thank you very much.

We too look forward to all that you're going to be doing in your role in the coming year. Please, folks, join me in honoring our 2017 Colorado Teacher of the Year.

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1 (Pause) 2 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: The next item on our agenda is recognition of four districts and schools for 3 their exemplary implementation of the student Individual 4 Career and Academic Plans, or ICAPs. Together with their 5 6 counselors, teachers, and parents, these students direct the process of meaningful career and college exploration through 7 ICAP. Commissioner Anthes, please. 8 MS. ANTHES: Yes, thank you, Madam Chair. 9 At this point, I'm going to turn it over to Misti Ruthven, our 10 Executive Director of Student Pathways, to introduce the 11 districts and the awards. 12 13 MS. RUTHVEN: Thank you, Commissioner Anthes, Madam Chairman, Members of the Board. 14 So this morning, the Individual Career and 15 Academic Plan is highlighted, and we've brought forward to 16 17 you ICAP teams in the award-winning districts and schools 18 that represent some of the best ways that ICAP provides meaning and excitement for students as they explore what is 19 possible in the world after high school. The Individual 20 Career and Academic Plan, or ICAP, was enacted into state 21 It was Senate Bill 256 in 2009. 22 law. This is the third year that the State Board 23

of Education will be recognizing ICAP recipients, and

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selections were made by past recipients and a panel of
 schools and district representatives.

So ICAP awards are divided into two 3 categories, schools and districts. The award recipients for 4 School ICAP teams include Lesher Middle School from Poudre 5 6 School District and the Colorado School for the Deaf and Blind. The recipients for District ICAP include teams from 7 Garfield 16 in Parachute and District 11 in Colorado 8 Springs. So we have also two honorable mentions: Del Norte 9 10 Middle School in the San Luis Valley and Westminster High 11 School.

As far as process goes, just a brief note on process. I'll read brief excerpts from the nominations and then followed by photos. There are a few folks of the recipients that would like to just give brief comments after each.

17 At Lesher Middle School, who'd like to join me? Come on up. At Lesher Middle School, students are 18 involved in the ICAP process all year. In November, many 19 20 were part of a future planning extravaganza, and the ICAP teams wrote about it for two days. Eighth graders attended 21 interactive sessions with professionals to learn more about 22 healthcare, law, real estate, and avionics, along with 23 24 postsecondary options like advanced placement, international baccalaureate, and concurrent enrollment. Then, they joined 25



1 their teachers and workforce center representatives for visits to businesses all over the Fort Collins area. 2 This program, one of many at Lesher, has open partnerships with 3 local businesses that have flourished. It builds 4 relationships with teachers, students, councilors, 5 6 administrators, and community members. Students look forward to this event, and parents are engaged. 7 Congratulations to Warren Morrow, school counselor, and 8 Stacy Arellano, and who are here from Lesher Middle School, 9 10 and they just wanted to say thank you. 11 MR. MORROW: Thank you. MS. ARRELLANO: 12 Thank you. 13 (Applause) MS. RUTHVEN: Next is the Colorado School for 14 15 the Deaf and Blind. The staff in the Employability Center at the Colorado School for the Deaf and Blind work with 16 17 students who exit our academic program with better sense of who they are and how they can meaningfully contribute to the 18 19 community. Included in the ICAP that each student designs are postsecondary education, independent living, and 20 employability goals they can live in their personal lives 21 and in their communities, because the ICAP goals are created 22 by and for them, which will then -- which they embrace as a 23

24 road map for their future.



1 Congratulations to Tera Lynn Gray from the 2 Colorado School of the Deaf and Blind. She's here to say a few words. 3 (Applause) 4 MS. GRAY: Thank you. I really -- I am 5 6 sorry. I have a cold, so my voice is not too great right now, but I do thank you for this honor. And while I am a 7 supervisor of the Employability Center at the Colorado 8 School for the Deaf and the Blind, we have a team of 13 9 other individuals that work very hard to help our students 10 to get an ICAP, to get a portfolio, to help them to 11 understand why high school is so important, but starting all 12

13 the way in elementary school. Helping them understand why it's important, and where they are going, and what goals 14 that they have for their futures. So we work with those 13 15 individuals, as well as for our schools for the deaf and the 16 17 schools for the blind, the teachers in there. It's really a collaborative effort. So I am really honored to be here to 18 19 accept this award on behalf of the entire school. So thank 20 you.

21 MS. RUTHVEN: Thank you.

22 (Applause)

MS. RUTHVEN: Next up is Garfield 16, and
representatives did not make it today because of the record



1 four feet of snow that the western slope has had over the 2 past week. 3 (Chuckling) MS. RUTHVEN: But we wanted to make sure and 4 recognize them, so I'll just briefly read their excerpt. We 5 6 believe that the ICAP is essential in helping our kids plan for their future, as well as helping the district plan to 7 meet their needs as they work toward essential and 8 professional skills. The ICAP is meaningful because it 9 focuses on students' interests. We are starting at a very 10 young age, engaging our students in as many experiences as 11 possible. They really take ownership of the process, and 12 each student is unique. Also, this process involves in-13 depth talks with parents about what is next and how they can 14 15 support their student. We see the ICAP much more relaxed -we see the students much more relaxed in their senior year 16 17 simply because they have a plan. And in the words of Ken Haptonstall, their 18 19 superintendent, "That is huge." So congratulations to

20 Superintendent Ken Haptonstall and their lead counselor,
21 Mandi Dovey, and I know that they're listening, so congrats
22 to them.

23 (Applause)



MS. RUTHVEN: And the next and the final 1 2 award is Colorado Springs District 11, and there are several representatives here today. So come on up, D11. 3 (Applause) 4 MS. RUTHVEN: So there's a trend here this 5 6 morning, with the Teacher of the Year and the ICAP recipients, all from Colorado Springs D11. 7 The ICAP leadership team behind me in 8 Colorado Springs District 11 has made ICAP a priority. 9 Internal and external stakeholders are driving the process. 10 11 Schools own their part in their process. Parents are engaged because they see the value. Students love learning 12 13 and charting their future because they see relevance in their day-to-day. Ownership is high. 14 We have written ICAP into District Board 15 policy as a graduation requirement. Even the mayor of 16 17 Colorado Springs is involved in promoting ICAP. Career and technical education programming participation is up. FAFSA, 18 19 which is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, completion is up, and college applications are up. And 20 remediation is down. 21 22 Dr. Gledich, our superintendent, calls it, 23 "Adding value to the handshake as we help students prepare for the world yet to be imagined." So congratulations to 24 the ICAP team from D11. We have Logan, Cory, Rob, Sandra, 25



1 and Julie, and Dan, who represent counselors and principals 2 from Russell and Holmes Middle School, and three 3 administrators from D11. And Dan, I believe you want to say a few words. 4 MR. AJAMIAN: Well, first and foremost, 5 6 welcome to D11 Day up at the State Board of Education. 7 (Chuckling) UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Thank you. 8 MR. AJAMIAN: What you'll also notice is that 9 10 it always takes a team effort to do any of these things and 11 to get them up and running for every child, all children in every single district. So thank you for the award. We're 12 13 very humbled by it, and with that said, I would like to introduce Sandy Watkins, who is a school counselor at Holmes 14 Middle School; her principal, Rob Utter; Logan Laszczyk, who 15 16 is our PWR, Postsecondary Workforce Readiness counselor, who 17 is available to us because of the school counseling Corps Grant. The school counseling Corps Grant has been a 18 catalyst for us to implement this work and make sure that 19 20 it's effective for every single student who connects with businesses. 21 And then, of course, we have Cory Notestine, 22 former School Counselor of the Year, National School 23 24 Counselor of the Year, and our Counseling Facilitator in

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1 District 11, and Julie Johnson, the principal at Russell 2 Middle School. So collaboratively, all of our work together 3 has made the ICAP effective, and we're very proud of that. 4 Thank you very much. 5 6 (Applause) UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: So I'd like to commend 7 all of you for your work in implementing the student career 8 and academic plans. You've demonstrated that working 9 together as school counselors, teachers, and parents and 10 students have successful impact on students, telling them 11 what they can achieve beyond high school. Please join me in 12 13 honoring these award winners, and then if you'll come forward one school at a time, we'll get a picture. Thank 14 15 you. 16 (Applause) 17 (Pause) 18 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Sure. Sure, sure. So 19 first, Lesher Middle School. 20 (Pause) 21 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: All right, eight more. Hold on. Just one sec. 22 23 (Pause) 24 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: No promises. (Laughter) 25

23	UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Okay, okay. So folks,
24	we're going to make a couple of comments, and then we're



1 going to recess in order to go across the street to hear the 2 State of the State. We'll be back in session at 1:00? UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Mm-hmm. (Affirmative) 3 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: At 1:00 today, but first 4 of all, Ms. Mazanec, you have a comment? 5 6 MS. MAZANEC: Yes, I failed to do this yesterday. But National School Choice Week starts the week 7 of the 22nd, and there will be a rally at the Colorado 8 Capital. I can bring you all scarves. 9 10 (Chuckling) MS. MAZANEC: On Thursday the 26th at 11:30, 11 and I hope to see everybody there supporting school choice 12 13 in Colorado. UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Great. Great. 14 Thank you, and if I may, I would like to provide some information 15 16 to my colleagues, which is that next Tuesday -- we got this 17 invitation kind of late -- next Tuesday, there will be a Colorado ESSA Summit that is sponsored by a number of 18 19 education organizations in the front range. It will take place at the Adams 12 Five Star School Conference Center, 20 which is in Thornton. You're going to receive a written 21 22 invitation. It goes from -- did we figure out -- 10:00 to 23 3:30. And you are all invited to attend. It will have lots of teachers and principals. It's a great opportunity to 24 hear comments from the folks who are in the trenches. And 25



1 they will be talking about some of the -- I believe some of 2 the recommendations that have been coming out of the Spoke 3 Committees. So I wanted to make sure you have that. 4 Sorry it's so late, but that's -- it just came to us quite 5 6 late. Jane, do you have a question? MS. GOFF: Yes. Thanks. I wondered that --7 is that intended to be a public meeting? Because it's out 8 in there as such. 9 10 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Yeah, I think they (indiscernible). 11 12 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Yeah. Help, 13 (indiscernible). MS. ANTHES: Yes, Madam Chair. I think it's 14 not organized by us, so it's organized by the various 15 16 organizations, so I'm not sure what their registration 17 situation is. There's probably some space limits there. But I think we haven't been in charge of the invitation, so 18 19 I'm not quite sure. 20 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: And actually, the invitation is literally coming after the registration 21 deadline. However, since we received an invitation, I have 22 a hunch we will be welcome. 23



MS. GOFF: Well, the invitation, the 1 2 announcement and the invitation with the details has been 3 the public sphere for about two to three weeks. UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Right. I received -4 MS. GOFF: So would you (indiscernible) this? 5 6 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: I received one directly, but I'm not sure The Board did. Just stumbling through 7 here. This came in -- this came to Denise yesterday. 8 9 Rebecca? MS. FLORES: And how much does it cost? 10 11 MS. McCLELLAN: And I apologize. Could you repeat the details just one time? 12 13 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Sure. It's next Tuesday from 10:00 to 3:30 in Thornton at the Adams 12 Five Star 14 Conference Center. And I think you have the invite right 15 16 there in front of you. 17 MS. McCLELLAN: Oh, thank you so much. Ι 18 apologize. You're right. 19 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: That should help. It's 20 not -- there's not an agenda on this invitation. I'm guessing there might be an agenda with the times somewhere 21 online. Would you happen to know, Dr. Flores? 22 23 MS. ANTHES: I just don't know. I'm sorry. 24 I'm making a few comments towards the end, but since we're 25 not organizing it, I'm not quite sure about the details, so.



1 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Same here. This might 2 be all we know. UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Thank you, Madam Chair. 3 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Dr. Flores, did you have 4 a question? 5 6 MS. FLORES: No, I was just wondering about the cost. 7 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Okay. There is not a 8 9 cost. It's supported by these organizations. MS. FLORES: Oh. 10 11 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: So I guess we're recessing again? 12 13 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Mm-hmm. (Affirmative) UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Until 1:00. 14 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Mm-hmm. (Affirmative) 15 16 Yes. 17 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Thank you, folks. Oh, you want me to hammer? Go ahead and hammer. 18 19 (Gavel bang) 20 (Chuckling) 21 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: We were going to head over there at 10:30? 22 23 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: It says 10:15. Yeah. 24 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Oh, that's when we 25 recess, so you're probably right.

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1	UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: So you shove us out the
2	door when it's time. Which means we walk around the
3	building, or we go in and oh, that's right, yes. So we
4	don't have to go through security. Got it. I should find
5	my nametag to put on. They like it when you have a nametag
6	down there. They think you belong over there.
