Overview of SB21-088 – Child Sexual Abuse Accountability Act

- January 1, 2022
- Civil action against the "actor" who committed misconduct on a child
- Civil action is extended to an employer or "managing organization"
 - Knew or should have known
 - Actor or youth-related activity posed a risk for sexual misconduct

Big Picture

- Fresh look at procedures, supervision, training
- Policies and practices apply to all employees and volunteers
- Check in with human resources and legal services professionals

Implementation

- Updating training
- Hiring and current employment practices
- Documentation and Records

Updated Training

- Establish practices
 - Continue to evaluate
 - One-on-one interactions
 - Obtain caregiver contact information
 - Policy on when the organization is responsible for youth
 - Signing in and out
 - Communicate in writing
- Who and when to train?
- Document training material, keep records of who and when trained

Updating On-Boarding Process

- Add training on policies and procedures to on-boarding process
- Review employment manual
- Review volunteer manual
- Gather acknowledgment of training by signature
- Keep records and documentation of all training

Escalating and Resolving Reports

- Confer with professionals
- Update Training
- Update Manuals employee and volunteer
- Document all reports
- Overlapping legal issues confer with legal counsel
