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EXPELLED AND AT-RISK STUDENT SERVICES (EARSS) GRANT PROGRAM

History

The "Services to Expelled Students" grant program was enacted by the Colorado state legislature in 1997. The statute was amended in 2000 to include students at-risk of expulsion and renamed the "Expelled and At-Risk Student Services" program. With additional amendments in 2008, funds can also support services to students at-risk of being declared habitually truant.

Eligible Applicants and Students to be Served

Funds are annually appropriated to the Colorado Department of Education for the purpose of making grants to school districts, alternative schools within school districts, charter schools, BOCES, non-profit, non-parochial schools, and facility schools. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis for a 4-year award period.

For the purposes of the program descriptions contained in this document, the term "at risk" indicates only the students eligible to be served by the grant. These students include only expelled students, students at risk of expulsion, and truant students defined by unexcused absences. Program descriptions may describe a broader context so not all strategies referenced may necessarily be fundable.

Purpose

The primary purpose of the grant is to prevent future expulsions and habitual truancy. Because non-attendance and disciplinary actions in response to misconduct are risk factors for dropping out of school, the EARSS program contributes to dropout prevention efforts by concentrating on early intervention strategies, student engagement strategies and supportive services to reduce these risk factors. At a minimum, grantees must provide educational services, meaning instruction for academic content areas.

Accountability and Sustainability

Grantees are required to set performance measures and report progress on their measures in the following three areas: academics, attendance, school discipline/safety or social-emotional wellness. Grantees currently in Year 3 and 4 also have a parent/family engagement measure.

To support sustainability efforts, the grant is structured with a scale-down of funds in the third and fourth year of the grant. Funds are reduced by 25 percent and 50 percent in years three and four, respectively, from whichever is the highest funded amount in years 1 or 2.

Appropriation and Number of Grants Awarded

For the 2020-21 school year the appropriation is \$9,493,560 and 57 grants are funded. This includes 13 EARSS Intervention Grantees (EIG) that were funded in a second round of funding the spring of 2017 when the legislature increased the appropriation by \$2 million.

Program Description: In 2017-18, 344 New America School-Thornton, Lakewood and Lowry high school students were habitually truant, 30 habitually disruptive and 74 received in- or out-of-school suspension. Through our EARSS program, we will assign 120 of these individuals, identified by our schools' support-staff data teams, to receive intensive case management services that include: the students, their parents and their case manager jointly developing a detailed educational, behavioral, attendance and resiliency-building strategic plan for the year and then monitoring adherence to that plan.
