## Colorado Department of Labor & Employment (CDLE)

### Migrant Seasonal Farmworkers

Federal regulations require that every Workforce Center offer the full range of quality employment services, benefits, and protections to Migrant Seasonal Farm Workers (MSFWs), afforded to non-MSFW on an equal level. The MSFW program assists those classified as either a migrant farmworker, a seasonal farmworker, or a migrant food processing worker.

The **Colorado Department of Labor & Employment** administers a bilingual (English/Spanish) outreach program to predominantly Spanish speaking clientele in accordance with 20 CFR 653 and as a significant MSFW State.

The six significant MSFW Workforce Centers (Brighton, Greeley, Lamar, Monte Vista, Delta, and La Junta) provide quality employment services and referrals to customers. Outreach efforts are accomplished by personal contacts with migrant and seasonal Farm workers to provide the full range of services.

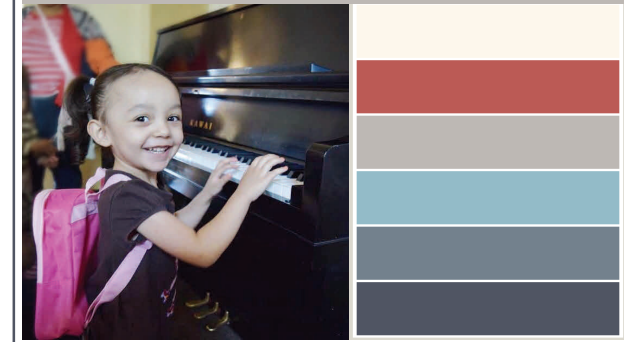

## The Migrant Student System of Support (MS3)

The Migrant Student System of Support (MS3) is a collaboration aimed at bringing together organizations that serve migrant families in Colorado. The goal is to create a seamless system of support for children and youth from birth through their first year in college. Through collaborative partnerships, our organizations work together to promote a greater understanding of each agency's services and eligibility requirements and to support the success of migrant children, youth and families statewide.



## Rocky Mountain Service, Employment, Redevelopment



Rocky Mountain SER (RMSE) Early Learning Centers operate the **Migrant & Seasonal Head Start program** serving 180 migrant children (ages 6 weeks old to 5 years old) and their families in Adams, Larimer, Mesa, Montrose, and Weld Counties who come every year from May to October to work in agriculture. RMSE provides quality child care including comprehensive services of education, health, nutrition, disabilities and family engagement.

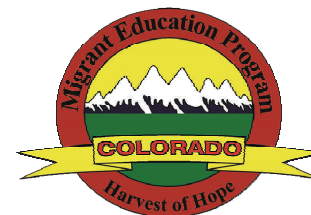
RMSE's workforce division is also the administrator of the USDOL's 167 National Farmworker Jobs Program for the state of Colorado. This program offers job training and support services to migrant/seasonal farmworkers.

The **Migrant Education Program (MEP)** provides supplemental support to eligible migrant children and youth between the ages of birth through 21 years. Services are coordinated with other federal, state and local educational services to support high-quality, comprehensive educational programs for migrant children to reduce educational disruptions and barriers resulting from repeated moves. The Colorado MEP delivers services through five regional offices located in Alamosa, Aurora, Grand Junction, Greeley and Pueblo. The main goals of the program are to ensure migrant students are ready for school (including preschool), succeed in school, graduate from high school, and make successful transitions to postsecondary education or employment.

## College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP)



The **College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP)** is a unique federally-funded educational support and scholarship program that helps more than 2,000 students annually from migrant and seasonal farmworking backgrounds to reach and succeed in college. Participants receive anywhere from \$750 to \$4,000.00 of financial support during their freshman year of college and ongoing academic support until their graduation. There are currently 43 national and 4 Colorado participating colleges/universities.
