	<p>Welcome and Recap from last meeting</p> <p>Guiding Legislation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cap4K – “Preschool to Postsecondary Education Alignment” included the first mention of the PWR Endorsed Diploma – an incentive and a stamp of readiness: C.R.S 22-7-1009 & 22-7-1017 • SB17-272 – “Postsecondary and Workforce Readiness Indicator” and define “higher achievement” levels for Graduation Guidelines menu, so that districts can get extra points for accountability through the PWR Indicator <p>Review: Please reference notes of this workgroup, Feb and Mar 8, and Apr 17, 2018. These notes include a discussion of the history of the endorsement, Graduation Guidelines, the New Admission Policy (begins fall 2019) from the Colorado Commission on Higher Education, and a report and presentation on the High School Metrics of Postsecondary Readiness from Education Commission of the States (measures of PWR). 	<p>Criteria for a PWR Endorsed Diploma</p> <p>The group considered possible criteria for the PWR endorsement, which included: Graduation Guidelines (GG) menu with higher achievement levels + new criteria that considered student pathways:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Complete a minimum of 100 documented hours in a work-based/experiential* learning experience *Work-based/experiential learning experiences include volunteer experiences, job shadows, Internships, externships, and/or apprenticeships that are aligned with the student’s ICAP • Complete a coherent pathway sequence of courses as determined at the district level, with a GPA of 3.0 or higher • Complete a Capstone that demonstrates your learning related to your pathway 	<p>Andy Tucker & Carl Einhaus</p>

Questions that the group considered:

- Does either of these prototypes get us any closer to an endorsement that meets our interest demonstrating focus on a specific pathway?
- Which one and why?
- The prototype that includes assessment scores could also be viewed as a higher bar per HB17-272. Is there value in the PWR endorsement including these assessment scores along with the demonstration of pathway focus?
- Are these prototypes equitable? Could each student in each school district in the state access these measures?

Group Discussion: comments and questions:

- Really like the value add of pathways. District creates pathways, students choose.
- Easy to understand for all districts
- Tangible for higher ed. However, since the PWR Endorsed Diploma legislation says, “guarantee admission,” will higher achievement levels get there? Which schools?
- Would world language fit?
- GG is college and career ready. Why do we need higher scores?
- Does GPA need to be cumulative instead of pathways only?
- Change “100 hours” requirement to minimum plan in “competency training”?
- Include Capstone OR Industry Certification (for pathway demonstration)?
- Students will end up in the workforce. We need to wrap brain around life-long pathway.
- Want to move away from assessment exams for college.

What is the value of a PWR Endorsed Diploma?

VALUE PROPOSITION statements from April 19:

- PWR Endorsed Diploma emboldens students to pursue their full potential. The endorsement provides a “signal” to the student, parents, postsecondary institutions and employers that the student has demonstrated mastery of academic skills necessary for completion of a four-year degree and a mastery of technical and essential skills required for success in the workplace.
- Acquiring a PWR Endorsed Diploma guarantees that a student has demonstrated workforce readiness which may lead to a job upon graduation. Will also guarantee admission to several Colorado colleges and increases admission opportunities for the selective/highly selective colleges.

Added Notes from May 17. The PWR Diploma:

- Is recognition at the state level
- builds student confidence
- Is not just checking boxes
- Allows students to be intentional with their plan and pathways
- **Need to get rid of the guarantee.** “Nothing in life is really guaranteed”
- Will be a benefit for middle of the road students
- Separate from others: above and beyond
- We must add World Language to the measures. It is an imperative for college and career readiness

Postsecondary and Workforce Readiness Endorsed Diploma

**Approved by workgroup for submission to CDE
- after resolution of Parking Lot issues (see below)**

In order to be eligible for the Postsecondary and Workforce Readiness (PWR) Endorsed Diploma, students demonstrate readiness for career and college through various measures.

Students meet or exceed district-determined graduation expectations, including a one semester course (minimum) of Civics;

AND: meet at least one of the following assessments for English AND for Math:

AND: Complete at least one year of world language

AND: Complete a minimum of 100 documented hours in a work-based/experiential* learning experience

*Work-based/experiential learning experiences include volunteer experiences, job shadows, internships, externships, and/or apprenticeships that are aligned with the student's ICAP

AND: complete a coherent pathway sequence of courses as determined at the district level, with a GPA of 3.0 or higher

AND: Complete a Capstone (or industry certificate) that demonstrates your learning related to your pathway

Notes: There is no guarantee of admission at UNC, CSU, CU/Boulder or Denver, Mines
The PWR Endorsed Diploma includes "higher achievement" criteria - SB17-272

- * Parking Lot:
- 1) ACT English cut score (18) is the same as ACT cut score for GG (18)
 - 2) IB cut scores are the same in English and math for GG (4)
 - 3) How do Math Pathways impact assessment cut scores?
 - 4) Do we include one year of world language?
