2009 Colorado Teacher of the Year Will Be Named Tuesday, Nov. 11

The Colorado Department of Education will announce the Colorado Teacher of the Year at an evening reception on Tuesday, Nov. 11 at the Arvada Center for the Arts and Humanities (6901 Wadsworth Blvd.). The event begins at 6 p.m.

The winner is chosen by a seven-member committee from a list of nominees of exemplary classroom teachers.

The recipient becomes the Colorado nominee for National Teacher of the Year honors and serves as a teaching ambassador to communities and organizations around the state and nation. The Colorado Teacher of the Year represents the entire teaching profession in Colorado.

The Teacher of the Year selection process includes a written application, letters of recommendation, classroom visits, endorsements from the teacher's district and personal interviews.

Nominees are judged on their ability to inspire students of all backgrounds and abilities. They are expected to play an active role in the community and to have earned the respect and admiration of students, parents and colleagues.

The finalists for the 2009 Colorado Teacher of the Year are:

 Highlands Ranch High School English and social studies teacher Susan Elliott. Elliott's love of learning emerged early as a child playing "school" in neighborhood backyards. Elliott says she learned the delicate relationship between self-esteem and academic achievement from her mother, a family services worker and her father, a teacher. Elliott believes that responsible teachers must produce adaptive, resourceful adults who have the capacity to excel in higher education and the workplace. - Lynn Jackson, a fourth grade teacher at Eldorado K-8. Jackson's focus as a teacher as been three-fold. She believes in the importance of building strong, trusting relationships, setting high expectations and providing a wide variety of tools for success for her students. She says all students must have an equal voice that allows equity and fairness in the classroom.
