<u>Best Practices In Developing Truancy Reduction Programs</u> - *Provides information on the five primary elements of a comprehensive community and educational strategy to combat truancy.* 

How to Evaluate Your Truancy Reduction Program - This is a "how to" guide.

Innovations in Truancy Prevention Practice: An Inventory of Selected Collaborations from around the United

States - This is an extensive report of court-led truancy programs based on interviews with professionals around the country.

<u>Joint Efforts to Improve to Improve School Attendance</u> - *Lists methods of joint collaboration involving: (1) The state level, (2) Law enforcement, (3) Juvenile courts and (4) The Department of Juvenile Justice.* 

The Legal and Economic Implications of Truancy: Executive Summary - A summary of a larger document, available from the National Dropout Prevention Center at Clemson University. It reviews variations in school attendance law, and discusses the legal and economic implications of truancy for youth and their families, schools, courts, law enforcement, business and the community.

Logic Model of Evaluation of the Truancy Reduction Program - Describes and charts in a PowerPoint presentation the four key elements used in the model which are: (1) Needs and capacities, (2) Strategies and activities, (3) Milestones or benchmarks and (4) Goals or results.

<u>Saving Money, Saving Youth</u> - This report analyzes three truancy reduction programs in Colorado. Tables illustrate the costs of the programs, versus the long term saving and benefits when students remain in and complete high school.

<u>Truancy Fact Sheet</u> - Gives basic definitions, discusses the extent of truancy as a problem, truancy as a risk factor, court and community responses, factors contributing to truancy, and components of effective truancy reduction programs.

<u>Truancy Prevention in Action: Best Practices and Model Truancy Programs - Executive Summary</u> - *This paper discusses the importance of using programs, practices and strategies that have already been shown to be successful in reducing truancy. The components of the proven programs are also discussed.* 

<u>Youth Out of School: Linking Absence to Delinquency</u> - *This is an extensive report linking delinquency, truancy, suspension, expulsion, and dropping out of school. It includes information about promising strategies and interventions, as well as many charts and graphs along with a bibliography.* 

<u>10 Things A School Can Do To Improve Attendance</u> - *Contains a list of 10 actions, along with a short description of what can be done by school administrators and teachers to improve student attendance.*
