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Adult Education and Family Literacy

Federal Grant Program

- Formula grant to states
- Competitive grant to local providers
- Colorado currently funds 40 programs

Purpose of AEFLA

- Assist adults to become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and self-sufficiency
- Assist adults who are parents to obtain the educational skills necessary to become full partners in the educational development of their children
- Assist adults in the completion of a secondary school education or its equivalent

Eligibility for AEFLA

For purposes of AEFLA, an adult is:

- 16 years of age
- Not enrolled or required to be enrolled under State law (17 in Colorado)
- Lacking basic skills, or high school diploma, or English proficiency
- All three must apply to be eligible



The Need in Colorado

- 23% less than high school diploma/GED live in poverty
- 216,000 adults over 25 no high school diploma/GED
- 80,000 adults between 18-24 no high school diploma/GED
- 181,000 adult workers need ESL (English as a Second Language)


