Clear Creek School District RE-1 2008-2009 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE PUBLIC

Dear Clear Creek School District Community Members:

Just as I was able to report last year, every school in the Clear Creek School District met the standard necessary to demonstrate adequate yearly progress under the federal No Child Left Behind legislation. The district results can be found at SchoolVIEW.org.

The Clear Creek staff has worked extremely hard during the past year to implement programs that engage students in their own learning. Every school in the district is developing instructional programs that focus on an inquiry approach to education. We believe that students will learn most effectively when they are actively involved rather than sitting at their desks taking notes. While teachers can be effective in transmitting information in small doses, for our students to learn in a truly effective way, they must be actively involved in their own education and must learn how to access information, to evaluate the value of the information that they encounter, and to use that information to problem-solve. The International Baccalaureate Program offers an approach that requires that kind of engagement by students. The King-Murphy staff is nearing the completion of a several year effort to provide the inquiry approach of I.B. The staffs at Carlson, CC Middle School, and CC High School are being trained and are beginning work on curricula that reflect an I.B., inquiry approach as well.

A major effort this year has been to develop a pre-kindergarten through 12th grade writing curriculum that aligns with the new state standards that were recently adopted by the State Board of Education. Writing skills have been identified as an area in which our students need greater focus. By the end of the year we will have a program in place that enables students to experience the same approach and use the same process and terminology as they move from grade to grade ---whether the students are in grade one or grade eleven. Through a consistent approach, we expect our students' writing skills to improve significantly.

During the months of October and November, a group of 28 citizens and employees met to consider the 21st century knowledge and skills that our students will need to be successful upon graduating from high school, whether they move on to college or the workforce. The group's final product emphasizes such things as thinking skills, interpersonal skills, collaboration skills, personal responsibility, the use of technology to locate quality information, and the ability to synthesize information and identify multiple solutions. The knowledge and skills that the committee identified as key learning components is very consistent with the inquiry approach that I previously mentioned.

Another key effort of the district is to incorporate the 21st century skills report into the deliberations of a graduation committee that will consider whether our graduation requirements need to be changed and, if so, in what manner. The committee will consider such issues as specific course requirements, consistency among staff in granting credit, and the level of achievement that students must attain in order to receive credit. The overall question guiding the committee's discussion is this: What does an excellence school system require of its graduates and how does it support students as it seeks to raise the expectations for all students?




COLORADO STUDENT ASSESSMENT PROGRAM - CASP





King-Murphy Elementary School

 reflected upon several PYP curriculum units. We are proud of our teachers at
 King-Murphy who have invested much time, effort, and teamwork to develop a
 highly academic, rigorous, and internationally minded 21st century curriculum
 for the students at King-Murphy.
- Student Council Brain Aerobics: Students learned over 7000 facts with a 92% accuracy on the challenge test. Money that was raised is used to further support technology, field trips, Science Fair, and Math Olympics.
- Talented & Gifted Program: Students are given the opportunity to accelerate
 their learning through advanced classes in math, spelling, reading, and
 writing. To develop high interest projects with rigorous standards of
 achievement that includes research, discovery, and inquiry-based learning.
- Technology in the Classroom: At King-Murphy, teachers are applying technology throughout the curriculum through the use of interactive Smartboards, Senseo clickers, document cameras, and ceiling-mounted projectors.
- Sixth Grade Students: The Sixth Grade students attend the Crow Canyon Archaeological Center. Funds for this academic and outdoor experience are raised through a student holiday wreath fundraiser.
- Reflections Art Program: Students have the opportunity to develop an
 individual art project that reflects a basic theme. These projects are judged by
 a local art panel. The panel awards the student project with ribbons based on
 how closely their project supports and demonstrates the theme. The
 Reflections Art Program is supported by the King-Murphy PTA.
- Fifth Grade Students: The students in Fifth Grade attend a field trip to Cal-Wood outdoor education center for three days.
- Extra-Curricular Activities: Our PTA, recreation center, parents and scouts make available a variety of extra-curricular activities, such as Go Paint, Martial Arts, Mad Science, Rhythmic Gymnastics, Basketball, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, art classes and after-hours tutoring.



Georgetown Communty School

- The CSAP average for all tests went from 55% in the last year before the charter school to 82% in the third year of the charter.

- 75% of Clear Creek Middle School teachers have earned a Master's Degree.
- Clear Creek Middle School students are offered advanced classes for Math and English.
- Clear Creek Middle School students may pick from a variety of extracurricular activities including: Cross Country Running, Volleyball, Cheerleading, Basketball, Wrestling, Ski Team, Track, Baseball and Student Council.

SAFE SCHOOL CLIMATE AND INFORMATION

Clear Creek School District's Safety Committee meets regularly to discuss school safety and related issues. The committee is composed of members from each of the schools, law enforcement agencies, emergency personnel, district attorney's office, transportation supervisors, maintenance supervisors, and Office of Emergency Management. Experts from other agencies are invited to participate on issues of importance to them.

We are proud of our school safety record over the past fourteen years, but our ultimate goal is for safe schools now and in the future.

The Clear Creek Safety Booklet and Crisis Plan were developed to provide an emergency plan of action and guidelines for staff, law enforcement, and emergency personnel should specific threatening incidents occur. These guidelines range from bomb threats to self-endangerment issues and from evacuations to communication needs. This handbook is discussed monthly at Safety Committee meetings and updates are provided to each school and agency as needed.

A partial listing of needs addressed by our school district to ensure each student can learn in a safe, civil, and positive environment includes:

- Student orientations at all grade levels are conducted at the beginning of the school year to discuss expectations, goals, and code of conduct.
- Threat assessment procedures have been implemented to evaluate threats of violence as reported by students, teacher, staff, or law enforcement personnel. All threats are taken seriously and evaluated by a school team trained to deal with serious threats. Jefferson County Mental Health assists with resources.
- Blueprints and maps of each school have been added to the School Safety Handbook, detailing essential information about every building in case of an emergency. Copies of all blueprints are also on file at the school district's maintenance building and each emergency responder is equipped with a copy.
- Renovations have been made to some schools in an effort to ensure safety from intruders.
- Safety cameras have been installed at each school in areas of concern for safety.
- The high school has established a "Sub Station" which the sheriff's office can use during school and while school is not in session. This provides more law enforcement visibility within the school and in the unincorporated areas of the county.
- Each school within the district has adopted emergency evacuations procedures that follow the guidelines from the Federal Homeland Security and the Colorado Department of Education. These evacuation procedures and crisis plans are in place for circumstances such as fires, explosive devices, hazardous materials spills, power outages, wildfires, and adverse weather conditions. Lockdown procedures and "shelter in place" have been established and are practiced in case of threats outside the schools.
- Administrative staff is certified with the National Incident Management System (NIMS).
