# PROMISING PRACTICES

Aurora Public Schools' Welcome Center aims to assist refugee and immigrant students in their transition to the school district and to provide academic support for these same students through targeted programming.

A centralized admissions system refers any immigrant and refugee families directly to the Welcome Center as a part of their school registration. During the intake process, families participate in an informal discussion to share information about their family's background and begin to create a relationship with district staff. This meeting allows Aurora Public Schools to be proactive about any issues that may arise during a child's schooling.

Parents are able to learn about the differences in academic and school community customs in the United States, and are able to participate actively in their child's academic development.

### RESEARCH BRIEF

The September 2017 issue of *Educational Leadership* magazine, entitled "In Sync with Families," included several new and interesting research findings and tips to improve family-school-community partnering (FSCP).

One article focused on what kind of parent involvement matters most. Researchers Angel L. Harris and Keith Robinson examined 63 measures of FSCP and how that "traditional measures of parental involvement fail to capture the fundamental ways in which parents help their children academically."

The researchers concluded that "stage-setting" is the most impactful way that parents can support their children's academic achievement. Stage-setting is "the degree to which parents convey the importance of education to their children and create and maintain an environment in which learning can flourish."

These findings support prior research which indicates that "subtle" forms of parent involvement (e.g. having high expectations, asking children what they learned in school) are more impactful than "overt" forms of parent involvement (e.g. being on the PTA, volunteering in the classroom).
