## Work Study Students

2014-2015 Student October Count

## Definition

- A program in which a student is working in a paid or unpaid position in exchange for high school credit.


## Funding Eligibility

- The work study program must be approved by the local board of education
- Each local board of education shall define the 'educational process,' which definition may include any work-study time provided under the supervision of a certificated or licensed teacher
- The district shall include only the work hours required to earn credit hours as defined by the student's schedule
- A student participating in a work study program only shall be counted for a maximum of part-time funding


## Audit Documentation

- Work study contract or other documentation evidencing the hours required to earn credit as defined by the student schedule
- Should be date appropriate and specify individual hours required to earn credit
- A copy of the board-approved program policies
- A copy of the board-approved educational process


## Work Study Student Example

Rosie Radish is scheduled for one period of work study. Her district's boardapproved 'educational process' indicates that 90 hours of work per semester is required to earn one high school credit. Rosie works five hours a day, and the first semester has 87 days. Rosie is working 435 hours in the first semester of school. How many hours of work can count towards Rosie's part or full-time eligibility?

## Work Study Student Example

Rosie Radish is scheduled for one period of work study. Her district's boardapproved 'educational process' indicates that 90 hours of work per semester is required to earn one high school credit. Rosie works five hours a day, and the first semester has 87 days. Rosie is working 435 hours in the first semester of school. How many hours of work can count towards Rosie's full or part-time eligibility?

90 hours can be used in the determination of full or part-time status since that is the amount of time required to earn one high school credit.
