

Advance Placement 2014

- 76,065 enrollment total in AP classes
- Hispanic/Latino = 12,832
- Native Hawaiian Pacific = 151
- Black/African American = 2,696
- Asian = 4,841
- American Indian/Alaska = 282
- 2 or more races = 2,776
- White = 52,487
- Out of 178 Colorado school districts only 78 reported enrollment in AP classes.

Post-Secondary Challenges

- College completion rates for Native students are lowest among all racial subgroups in the United States, despite the fact that achievement in the K-12 system actually is statistically higher for Native students than it is for their Black or Hispanic peers.
- Low college completion rates may be the cause of access to financial resources for college expenses. The United Negro College Fund, for instance, took on the challenge of making college more affordable for Black students and has successfully funded many college educations over the years.
- Poor communication between tribes and colleges.
- Students are lacking post secondary preparation around financial literacy and time management



Resources & Graduating our Native American Students



What can we do?

- Ensure access for Native students to a curriculum that prepares them for the rigors of a new economy and college, thus enabling them to fully participate in the workforce.
- Address the multi-dimensional, contextual problems associated with decreased achievement in schools before students begin school, thereby helping them arrive at school ready to learn.
- Offer an outstanding teaching force to American Indian/Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian students.
- Increase the voice of Native peoples and their participation in the work of schools, and make schools more culturally relevant places for Native children.
- Increase awareness on the issue of American Indian/Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian student achievement by sharing best practices and research on Native students.
- Ensure adequate distribution of resources to Native students.

- College visits
- College fair
