



Post-school outcome interview

- What are we measuring?
 - What Colorado's former students with IEPs are up to 1 year after they exit from high school.
- Why?
 - So that AUs and the state learn if their programs worked/didn't work, and to use the information for review and improvement of their current programs.
 - Indicator 14 for OSEP.
- How?
 - Between May and September 2017, AUs called their former students who exited high schools during the 2015-2016 school year.
 - All interviews were recorded in the Data Management System.

Quick Stats


As a state,

- We had approximately **5134** "exiters" in SY2015-16.
- 3651 of them were selected in the interview sample.
- This sample was reduced by 63 students who either returned to High Schools or passed away.
- Among the remaining 3588 students, 2008 (56%) participated* in the interview.

*Participated = Indicated as "interview began" as the contact outcome.




Many AUs increased participation rates ③






Who participated in the PSO interview?




Participation among African American former students increased significantly in 2017! All other racial groups increased their participation rates as well ©

Interview Participation Summary

Yay!!

- As a state, the participation rate increased from **52 to 56**%!
- Significantly more African American former students participated this year!!
- The participation rates increased across various demographic.

Example Interview Questions

Postsecondary School

- At any time since leaving high school, have you ever been enrolled in any school, job training, or education program?
- At any time since leaving high school, were you enrolled in a 2-year or 4-year college or university?

Employment

- At any time since leaving high school, have you ever worked?
- How many hours do/did you work each week?

Agency Link

 Did you participate or are you currently participating in a Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Service?

School-related Info

Did you participate in services for students ages 18-21 in your school district?



4 categories of post-school outcomes

When we examine the data and report to OSEP (Office of Special Education Programs) at USDE, we use 4 categories of post-school outcomes:

• Enrolled in Higher Ed

Youth has been enrolled on a full- or part-time basis in <u>a community college (two year program) or</u> <u>college/university (four or more year program)</u> for <u>at least one complete term</u>, at any time in the year since leaving high school.

Competitively Employed

Youth has worked for pay at or above the minimum wage in a setting with others who are nondisabled for a period of 20 hours a week for at least 90 days at any time in the year since leaving high school. This includes military employment.

Enrolled in other postsecondary education or training

Youth has been enrolled on a full- or part-time basis for <u>at least 1 complete term</u> at any time in the year since leaving high school <u>in an education or training program</u> (e.g., Job Corps, adult education, workforce development program, vocational technical school which is less than a two year program).

Some other employment


Youth has worked for pay or been <u>self-employed</u> for a period of <u>at least 90 days</u> at any time in the year since leaving high school. This includes working in a family business (e.g., farm, store, fishing, ranching, catering services, etc.).

When a student is not in any of the above categories, the student is considered as "Not Engaged in the Community."



Measurements ABC

The 4 PSO categories feed into measurement ABC under **State Performance Plan Indicator 14**, upon which Colorado and AUs are evaluated.



When a student is not in any of the above categories, the student is considered as "Not Engaged in the Community."




How are we doing on Measurements ABC?





Post School Outcomes 2015, 16, & 17




Students who pursue higher ed and competitive employment have been increasing, whereas other postsecondary ed/training and other employment have been decreasing.




Outcomes by Demographic

BY GENDER




BY RACE



Females are equally likely to proceed to higher ed and competitive employment (30% for both). Males are more likely to get into competitive employment than higher ed. 50% of students who received certificate and who reached maximum age were not engaged. Those who received regular diploma are going to higher ed or competitively employed. Those who dropped out are either competitively employed or not engaged.

BY EXIT CATEGORY




20% of Hispanic students proceed to higher ed whereas 32% for other minority. Competitive employment and non-engagement are the highest for the Hispanic population.



By Disability








Enrollment or Employment?

Interpretation example: 50% former students at Charter School Institute are enrolled in some ways and 40% were in employment.




Additional Post-School Supports

Were students who receive work-related support more likely to be engaged?




competitive employment.
