Serving Meals During an Emergency or Disaster

In the event of an unanticipated school closure, extreme weather event, natural disaster, or other similar situation, School Food Authorities (SFAs) or other Child Nutrition Program (CNP) sponsors can serve no-cost meals to children in the affected areas. Follow the steps in this document to see how meals may be provided to children and implement strategies to ensure a rapid response in the event of an emergency or disaster.

Action steps to prepare for an emergency or disaster

Before



- Complete an <u>Emergency Readiness Plan</u>
- Designate a chain of command
- Purchase shelf stable food items to keep on hand



-Ensure staff understand their role during an emergency -Practice the emergency readiness plan

-Buy items like shelf stable milk, crackers, and shelf stable meals



During

- Track and document all meals served and all expenses
- Communicate meal distribution information to students, families, and community



-Use the <u>daily meal count form</u> or similar method to track meals

-Promote meal locations and times through social media, school website, and community partners



After

- Assess effectiveness of Emergency Readiness Plan and re-evaluate as necessary
- Take product inventory



-Did families know how to access meals?

- -Did you run out of key items that need to be restocked?
- : -Was the plan implemented as intended?
- -What worked, and what didn't?
