What We Know

Nationwide, public school counselors are overworked and under-resourced. The impact-or lack thereof-that school counselors have on students is easiest to understand in the high school context, where students face an increasingly dizzying array of choices about what comes next after high school.

MORE SECURITY GUARDS THAN SCHOOL SCHOOL

Do Others Know What We Are Able To Do?

The average student-to-school-counselor ratio is 482-to-1-nearly double the 250-to-1 ratio recommended by the American School Counselor Association. Why don't others know who school counselors are and what they are able to do?


This Is Our Story



A noun is the name of a person place or thing.


DEFINITION


