Help patron engage with a child anytime, even if child is far away

Enhance library relevance for the patron and child

Increase literacy level of adult patron

Increase literacy level of child

Strengthen the adult-child relationship

Strengthen the relationship between noncustodial or distant parent and caregiver

Give the child a reader and library user as a role model

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

Read to the Children program

## What is Read to the Children?

Since 1999, the Colorado Department of Corrections libraries and the Colorado State Library have provided donated children's books for incarcerated parents to read. Facility library staff record the parents reading and send the recording with the book to the child. Caregivers report that children who participate in this program maintain more positive relationships with their parents and spend more time with books after starting the program.



# How it could work in your library

- 1. Library supplies children's books and recording equipment.
- 2. Patron schedules time to record the reading.
- 3. Library staff transfers recording to a CD.
- 4. Patron sends the CD and book to the child.

#### What you need

Books - can be donated or weeded from the collection and cleaned up, or patrons can bring in their own books

A quiet area for recording

Library staff or volunteers to demonstrate reading techniques and how to use recording equipment

#### One-time investment:

Digital voice recorder \$100-125

#### For each recording:

Blank recordable CD 13-42¢ each

CD case 29-75¢ each



#### Other ideas

Offer recording opportunities after children's storytime at your library.

Encourage ESL students to select children's books and make recordings as class project.

Connect to summer reading programs.

Create video recordings instead of audio!
