CONCEPT-BASED LESSON PLANNING PROCESS GUIDE

Friday Afternoon Live: Improvisation and Sketch Comedy

Drama - High School, Fundamental Pathway

(Integrated Dance - creative movement through improvisation)

Note: The shaded areas indicate the shifts from more traditional lesson planning to a concept-based instructional design and asks teachers to metacognitively reflect on their planning. The red cells and shading indicate the primary focus of our work at the Institute. **The process guide is to help make visible "the invisible thinking" in which teachers engage as they plan lessons.** The guide is not intended to suggest that templates in use by teachers or in districts should be replaced; in fact, the process guide may be a valuable tool when used "side-by-side" with other lesson planning templates or tools. The intention is to illustrate the type of questioning that should occur consistently with any planning process when considering the instructional shifts implicit in the Colorado Academic Standards.

Formative assessment will be a quick Check for Understanding in which students will demonstrate they are or are not on track.

Formative Assessment

Formative Assessment tool/method: Reflective Evaluation

- How can writers (*choreographers*) utilize improvisation to develop sketches (*movement phrases*)?
- What ways can feedback be delivered effectively to an improvisation performer?
- **Extended:** How do members of an ensemble function within the parameters of a given form of improvisation?

Learning indicators of success:

Students will be able to articulate (knowledge):

- The expectations of their own behavior and decision making within the improv as it relates to others
- The importance of artistic choices and exploration in developing sketches (movement phrases)

Students will demonstrate fluidity and confidence with (skills):

- Improvisation
- Commitment to character
- Working together defining and valuing each member of the ensemble

What "indicators of success" will show that the students are gaining mastery?

How will I use that evidence in a feedback loop?

Reflection: The strengths in this lesson plan were the aspects of ensemble building between the actors and the dancers. There are not too many changes I would make to the overall plan. It worked well.

Connection to Performance Goal: The student's journals are excellent artifacts that illustrate the connection of learning from the improvisational activity to the completion of the written script. I would use student journals as examples for my professional growth plan.

Student Feedback: Student feedback was favorable. The actors and the dancers understood the correlation of movement and improvistion for character development and scene building.
